what articles premiums shall be allowed on. 12. This society shall hold an annual meeting to be designated by the President, together with the Executive committee for the exhibition of stock, farm implements, and anv and every kind of articles produced on the farm, from the garden, work ship, or domestic manufacturies.

14. This Constitution may be altered or amended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present at the annual meeting of the society.
