Mrs. Susan Sillers Darden was born September 20, 1816; married Jesse Harper Darden (1811-1895) in July 1832; and passed away February 25, 1880. The couple lived south of Fayette, Jefferson County, Mississippi near what is now called the Stampley Community, or neighborhood. Two of their daughters married members of the Wade and Killingsworth families. Other Darden clan marriages link most all of our families in ancestral relationships in Jefferson County, dating back to the times when the area was under British, French and Spanish Dominion.

The owner's name on the cover of the book, of which a typescript copy has been made and will follow, is "ADINE WADE FULTON". To You, Adine, and your Honorable Husband, Cousin John Rivers Fulton, we are deeply indebted for the very generous loan of your bound volume of a typescript of the Diary of Susan Sillers Darden. Adine and John's address is Box 342, Fayette, Mississippi 39069. As Coz. Adine explained, she obtained her copy through the cooperation of Mrs. Greathouse, emeritus Librarian of the Fayette Branch, Copiah-Jefferson Region Library when the transcript was available in loose-leaf form in 1975. It had reportedly been typed by college students.

There are many people to whom we are indebted for guarding the safety of the original Diaries over the past century and more. To everyone who contributed to its preservation and publication in The Fayette Chronicle, our earnest thanks are given.


As an assist to you close family members with whom I have been in personal touch or through correspondence, a very brief Table of Contents and a page or two of comments will be attached.

INTRODUCTION

Mr. Caleb F. Darden has generously provided the information that he obtained the originals from Lottie Wade of Red Lick, Mississippi and Jeanne & Anon K. Darden. His letter follows.

It is an assumption of mine that Miss Lottie Wade was the resident of Old Rosswood and a descendant of Dr. Walter Ross Wade and Mrs. Mabella Jane Duncan Chamberlain.

Mrs. Mary Campbell Bryan has most generously, for the hundredth or more time, provided a statement that is also attached, following Mr. Darden's letter.

She has also provided several sheets of genealogical data concerning the Darden family and the Ebenezer Church. These data will follow her letter of 5 IX 78, (that's September 5 of this year). (Thanks, again, Coz.).

The map of a portion of Jefferson County will follow it, and two locations are marked as being the probable location of the homesite of Susan Sillers & Jesse Harper Darden at the time the Diary was recorded. The northernmost, nearest Fayette, is a "Guesstimate" provided by Cousin Mary Campbell Bryan; the southernmost was provided by the Rural Route Mail Carrier for the Stampley community, whose name I do not know. Should the exact location be learned, with certainty, at a later date, you will be advised by a supplemental memo.

Following that is a current map of the State of Mississippi, included primarily to permit one to look up the location of places that are mentioned in the diary, like "Boliver County", Lake Providence, and others.

After that, on the page preceding the Library Copy title page, there will be a Table of Contents page just to show where each year begins.

And, for you Cousins & Kinfolk who have shared this ancestor-hunting adventure with me over these past five years, there is a xerox copy of the original last page of the diary, in the handwriting of Susan Sillers Darden. It was obtained from the Mississippi Department of Archives & History, and has been cut and pasted to fit an 8½ x 11 sheet, two pages.

HOW DO WE FIT INTO THE PICTURE? ARE WE 'DARDEN COUSINS'?

Like the leaves off of a single tree, each of us is unique and will have to study the available information and narrative of the diary to arrive at the factual answers to those questions. The author was the mother-in-law of Dr. Patrick Henry Wade, who was a first cousin of Dr. Walter Ross Wade of Rosswood Plantation, and nephew of our great-great-grandmother, Mrs. Jane Brown Ross Wade (Daniel) Ross (J. I. W.R. Sr.). The author's son married Sallie Killingsworth, whose grandfather was Michael Woods Trimble.

Introduction, page two:

Everyone of you with whom I have corresponded about family history will find something in the diary that relates to your ancestors or kinfolk. A few entries, that had special significance to me, were:

September 24, 1860: Robert Trimble and wife demitted from Ebenezer Presbyterian Church to join the Methodist Church. (They were our maternal great-grandparents.)

August 17, 1861: Allison Wade and Ellen Cogan were married. (Great-grandparents, and they were also the parents of Willie Jeff Wade, David Wade, Aunt Minnie Aurelia Wade Killingsworth, Daniel Brown (Uncle Brown, also later called Isaac) Wade, Uncle Beulard Wade and other children. Ellen Cogan was the sister of our grandfather, Cicero Jefferson Cogan.

August 23, 1861: Allison Wade departed for service in the Confederate Army, one week after marriage. - The dates of this and the immediately preceding entry are evidence that great-grandfather Allison R. Wade is the same man listed in the official Confederate Army files as "A. R. Wade". He served in Captain Put Darden's Company L, Artillery, also commanded at other times by Captain W. L. Harper as the Jefferson County Horse Artillery, Mississippi Volunteers.

October 10, 1870: Mr. Darden reported by his wife to have seen Adalade Trimble in Fayette, and she said her youngest daughter had recently died. - This was most likely Mrs. Elizabeth Adelaide Wade Trimble, widow of Robert Curran Trimble, our maternal great-grandparents, and the child who had passed away was most likely Matilda Adelaide Trimble, age 13.

June 16, 1872: Jack Ross was ordained Deacon of the Red Lick Church. This was John Isaac Wayne Ross, Jr., our great-grandfather; husband of Helen Beatty Green Ross.

August 18:1873: Jeff Chamberlain and Eugene Ross, son of Mr. Jack Ross, joined the Presbyterian Church yesterday, said the entry. Eugene Allison Ross, Sr. was our grandfather.

December 16, 1873. Dr. Patrick Henry Wade and his wife, Martha Darden Wade, named their newborn child Hellen Ross Wade after Mrs. Jack Ross. Hellen (Helen) was our great-grandmother.

January 27, 1876: Mr. Trimble (very old), Mrs. K's father, is confined to his bed. - This refers to Michael Woods Trimble and his daughter, Matilda Trimble (Mrs. Anapias, Sr.) Killingsworth; our great-great-grandfather, Mike Trimble,

Introduction, page three:

apparently lived the last years of his life at Holly Grove Plantation, ancestral home of the Killingsworth Family, founded by Noel Killingsworth on land purchased from John I. W. Ross, Sr.

March 12, 1876: Mr. Trimble died and was to be buried at the Killingsworth Family Cemetery, according to Noel Killingsworth. - This indicates that Michael Woods Trimble (1788-1876) lived to be 88 years of age.

March 17, 1876: Mrs. Laura Darden Bridewell, daughter of the author of the diary, agreed to teach "Mr. Wade and Mr. Jack Ross' children."

February 18, 1877: Reported the death of Mrs. Mabella Wade. This corroborates the date of passing of Mrs. Mabella Jane Duncan Chamberlain Wade, widow of Dr. Walter Ross Wade, of Rosswood.

As you will observe, the Diary of Susan Sillers Darden is a treasury of information concerning the births, marriages and deaths of many families living in Jefferson County. - The preceding observations and comments are only a small part of the facts involving ancestors of the Allied Families.

Finally, it will be of particular interest to you who have read the Journals of Dr. Walter R. Wade of Ross Wood Plantation, Jefferson County, Mississippi, particularly the one covering the last years of his life (1855-1862).

It is a pleasure to send this copy of the Diary to you as a gift.

Dear Jewell:

To answer your request that I tell you about my part in typing the Susan Sillers DARDEN Diary is like trying to catch a feather in a blizzard!

'Twas in the early 1960's I agreed to make 1 original & 1 carbon of the Diary from a handwritten copy of the carbon, which Caleb F. DARDEN had placed in the Miss. Dept. of Archives, Jackson, Miss.

James N. Woolridge, Archivist at the Dept., sent Caleb a letter on 9 Oct 1968 confirming receipt from me of the 2 copies of Part II of the Diary. While typing same, I realized there were many people mentioned therein, whose genealogical data was in my files. Thus, all parenthetical data was inserted by me. Some of it may be inaccurate due to faulty data, at that time, in my files.

'Twas 1 April before the Dept. "found" those two "lost" copies and had them bound and on 4 Sept 1969 they sent one bound copy to Caleb as per their promise, stating that my tribute to Susan Sillers DARDEN and a list of the genealogical data of the children of Jesse Harper DARDEN and Susan would be included in the binding.


As to how the copies of the Diary (in serial form) came to be printed in "The Fayette Chronicle" I know little. I assume, in Caleb F. DARDEN's correspondence with Mrs. Marie F. Walker, Editor, he suggested she print it and she agreed. However, he must have sent her typed copies of his handwritten copy, as none of my inserted parenthetical matter of Part II was printed.

I do not have the dates on when my copies of Part I of the Diary reached the Dept. of Archives. They were sent by me to Caleb and he mailed them to the Dept.


The Diary is filled with much history of a farm family's life in EARLY Mississippi and should be preserved.




FAYETTE






SUBJECT: DARDEN FAMILY GENEALOGICAL INFORMATION

Our Cousin, Mrs. Mary Campbell (Mrs. Joseph Dumble) Bryan, 431 Clinton Heights Avenue, Columbus, Ohio 43202, has been collecting genealogical and historical information concerning Jefferson County inhabitants for nearly a half century. A native of the County, she has pursued her research in the major centers where personal history facts are preserved, such as the Adams County Court Records Library, Natchez; Jefferson County Court House, and other record centers too numerous to list. She has most generously shared her information and has been the primary resource person for authors of many published articles in this subject matter area. Her "Allied Families" in Mississippi and the precedent Natchez District include the surnames of Campbell, Cooke, Girault, Davenport, Pettitt, Yancy, McCaleb, Spain, Holt, Truly, Green, Smith and others.

Her character as a researcher is described by one colleague as "careful, thorough, demonstrating penetrating insight and respect for the truth."

She has most generously permitted me to include the attached five pages on the

Genealogy of the Darden Family, and

Notes Concerning Presbyterian Church History, including Reference to Ebenezer and Union Churches in Jefferson County.

Presbyterian Settlements.

There were parties of Scotch Presbyterians who settled in Jefferson + Vilasone Cos. This was adjoining the district already known as New Scotland, + the region already known as New Scotland, + the region retained a distinctly Scotch character to a late date. Scotch dialect was long spoken among these people -

* The southeastern portion of Jefferson Co. was known as the Scotch Settlement, as you will readily infer from the names of families who lived there, Turvey, Fairly + Fairley, Dardens, etc. - (Author)

2. Meigs, 2d + Montgomery were sent in 1800 by the Presbyterian Assembly and the Synod of the Carolinas to examine into the Religious Condition of the Miss. Settlements. After a ministry of a few months in the Hatchet District they returned to Carolina to make a report. Later Montgomery came back + entered upon a regular ministry at Hatchet. Representative of Miss. West. Society 1810 p. 54 + by Mr. Hall of a report of his observations makes history reading interesting.

The newcomers built (200) built the church houses of Ebenezer and Union Church, about which communities grew. (Emphaz.)

John K. Betterworth - Stark Co. Author

By 1812 there were 8 Presbyterian churches in Jefferson, Tex.
