The following section was in the poorest condition of all three books. There are words missing because the pages had been folded in half and had broken with age. The main body of it is missing, however part of it was found by Mildred Coley in Jackson Miss. and part of it by Dunbar Wade in Kansas City Kans. quite a distance apart so who knows, maybe some day more will be discovered some place else.

Jan 1887

Pa and myself returned from a surveying wxpedition for Mr. Bob O'Quin in the Brandywine neighboorhood Claiborn Co. the 16th of Jan

On Friday the 15th the old gravel road or Sulerven plantation was destroyed by fire. The gin dwelling, 3 quarter houses and about mile fence interly destroyed. As no one was living on the place it can not be accounted for as to how the fire came about.

In Jan Frank Hall and myself cut and shaped out 275 white oak posts for wire fencing on big road west and Rob also cut 150 locust and mulberry.

Emmette and myself went down to Mr. Row Cogan and squirl hunting

Jan 7 and 9th. But killed 1 only. But Em on a hunt before this killed

Jan. 1887 Uncle Wilson died December 1886 buried at Prospect Hill.

Uncle Bob and Walter put the wire fence along the road reaching from our red oak corner up to Mr. Schwartz corner Jan and Feb 1887 This is the first wire fence put on the plantation.

We had a big snow on 4th of Jan 1879, measuring from 10 to 14 inches. And on the 4th of Jan 1887 another one measuring from 12 to 13 inches

Pa bought a big---from Mr. A.Schwartz 1886, paying him \$35.00 for it on time. It is a (thimble sceam) or wooden axle.

I carried the plows to Mr. Pauls to be sharpened on the 17th

Jimmie and Blount went down to the Stewart place Dec.

Frank Jones, one gallon of molasses Jan 15, 1887

I bought one hatchet on 29 Jan from L.Cohn

We started to work on wire fence next to Mrs. Wallice Woods on 22nd Jan 1887, We got nearly all of the posts out of the woods of Mrs. Wallice which were Mulberry and chinqupine. Cleared off the rout of the live, cut the posts, dug the holes set and halled the posts with in two days the distance being ½ mile. Five hands regular. Marshall and myself halled the old rail from the line along Mrs. Wallice on 31 Jan and 1st of Feb. Started the --hors lot of the cocopatch and--corn bottom and hall and piled--big load in the yard it a --up the old yd. fence and---big expense. On 1st day of Feb I am twenty years of age.

Wire fence built in creek field Jan 1887 about a 1 of a mile next to the McCaa wood. Calvern Co--who want the field. The posts are red oak this fence was built in place of a rail fence that was destroyed by fire. It is first wire on place.

I gave Charley Wade my old bow. I caught and belled a long wing buzzard on the 2nd of Feb, put a little old dinner bell on him. At first he did not seem tolike the music of the bell but he soon got use to it and went on as if nothing was the matter. I am anxious to know if we will ever hear from the old gentleman again, marks of bell were X 1887 B

we knocked the cotton stocks on first of Feb. Our Frank cut the cain and briers at our edges of the --- 1-2-3 of Feb.

Marshall and my self put up the fraim of the new house on satterday. Frank one gallon of molasses Feb 3rd

Mr. Wrates built a log hen house for himself in Feb Sam built him one to in Feb also. Frank Jones did build the same so I guess we wil raise a good chicken crop in 1887. I presume chicken pies will not be a rair artical along about June or July.

I spent the day with Mary Richardson and Mattie Wade at Cottage Home Sunday Feb 6 enjoyed very-- day too, Mary has been at Cottage Home for two weeks and will probly stay two wks longer then she will go down to her father below Natchez.

Cousin Cabble Richardson move from Vinyard to----Jan 1886 then Seaborn Ross moved from Blan-- to where he is to date Feb 8, 1887

James Killingsworth returned from Texas Dec 1886 after five years rom-ing the lone star state. Eugene Ross returned July 1886 after five
years stay in the -----state of the sunny south. Both gave dry
acct of texas.

Wade H.Richardson left clerking Merett S.E. Marks and Co Red Lick Feb 15, 1887 and went in a plantation store in La, some where below Natchez. He is on the same place with his Pa, C.B.Richardson. Wade leaves many warm friends of both sex who greatly regret to loose him from amoungst our midst. Wade went to clearking for Merse S.E. Marks and co in the fall of 1884 I think he made faithful clerk as well as sailable I believe. He was love by all black and white, old and young but alas while he is gone he leaves Old Red Lick Richardsonless all have cast there future care in—— on the waters of the Frog———pondry La.

Sister and Pug was taken sick Saturday Feb 1,

Rained Saturday night and part of day Sunday and all day Tuesday 19-20-22 This is the first rain we have had since August last to amount to anything. A verry strange and dry winter has this been.

Left my book lying on table and Richard did this black spot(ink blot)

We streatched wire next to Mrs Wallaces wood in the back side of old Mackey field Feb 23

Em, Marshall, Frank and myself rolled the logs off of new grown-behind the old house and broke it up Feb 31

In Dec 1886 and Jan and Feb of 1887 Mr. Harry McCl uer of Fayette and Mr. Hammon of Harriston were agents for getting negros to go to the Yazoo Delta to work for wages and succeeded in getting quite a number to leave the above named places before the people of the neighborhood discovered who the agents was. After the discovery a metting was held among the farmers and a commettee was apointed to warn the agents that they had better leave the county and that with in the next 24 hours after they were warned they Mc Clure and Hammon with hesittation left the county. yours The Fayette Chronicle

There is quite well informed great numbers of negros have left from all over the county gone to Yazoo bottom and Deer Creek country.

Mar, 1887

We started to breaking corn land Mar 3 I sent an order off to New York City to Ehright Bros March5 Carried my Pup (Dora) up to Seaborn Ross Mar to get Seaborn to train her.

My pup I shall call Dora was born 5,1886. I went down on the creek fishing saturday April 16 but did not catch any fish, the parties with me were Mr. McMerchy, D.B. Wade, Emmette, Jeff Chamberlain, Willie Catt Harper Scott, Percy Chamberlain and three or four others little fellows, but no fish.

The killing of Henry Tillotson by A.W.Killingsworth March 4, 1887 One of the most terrible tragedies which ever occured in this county was enacted last Sunday evening at Hayes Station in the killing of young Harry Tillatson by Mr. Arkright W.Killingsworth of Cannonburg. The reports that have reach here are of such a confliciting nature and ther being no one present except the slayer, his victim and Mrs. Killingsworth it has been impossible to get at the true facts in the case. The tragedy was a bloody sequel to domestic infeldity.

About one year ago Mrs. Killingsworth took up her residence at Hayes while her husband remained on his place near Cannonsburg and the -was that a quiet sepration was agreed upon. Mr. Tillatson had been employed in the depot at Hayes as agent and operation and became acquainted with Mrs. Killingworth. What this acquaintance to we cannot say, but it can be surmised from the sedperate act of the It is known here that Mrs. Killingsworth visted Hays and passed down the road Sunday morning with his children that he returned up the road on the same afternoon when the killing took place. Tillotson was shot six times with a 44 calibar revolover and instantly died. A warrant was issued for Killingsworth but up to going to press he has not been arrested and it is impossible to make a full and correct report of the case until a prelimmary exmination has been made. parties to the tragedy are well known in Fayette. Mr. Killingsworth was born and reared in this county and has always been considered a good and useful and peaceful citizen and respected by all and greatly admired by his friends.

The victim was a son of Prof. Tilliatson who taught school her not long since. And the young man, then but a boy was very quiet and gentlemenly and the surprise was great when it was learned that he had involved himself in the domestic affairs of another to such an extant as to jeopardise his life.

Sympathy for all has been great but it is generally realized that is such a soleman matter as this comment without substanceual facts would be injustice to the living or dead. Mar.4, 1887 the Fayette Chronical

We started to planting corn on 15 March. We finished breaking up the corn field in old McCy field.

We started to breaking up corn bottom on 14th. We seranaded the county on Satterday night..

Last Friday Mr. A.W. Killingsworth, who shot and killed Mr. Henry Tillatson at Hayes recently came in and surrended himself to Sheriff L.H.Carradine. The warrant for his arrest had been issued by Justice Coffey of Fayette and Mr. K asked and was granted a change of venue to Justic Johnsons Court of the second District. The defandent on his preliminary examination next dayat Red Lick was represented by Messers Torrey and Truly. No one appearing for the proscution. After the examination of a few witness there being no direct testimony the court declared it a case of Justifiable homicide and Mr. K was not charged. Fayette Chronical March 11,1887

The young people of Red Lick all met on Uncle Jack Razzis fish pond satterday March 24 and had a very nice picnic. We enjoyed ourself by boat, fishing, laughing and talking and eating and listening at the violin music by Dick Scott, Charley Williamson, Walter Wade, Mary Richardson.

Mary Richardson staying at Uncle Pats. Visiting Lottie Wade. I went up to call Fryday night carried my violin with me had a verry pleasant visit. Mary and I treated our selves to some music on the violin and piano, the first time I ever played with anyone on the piano. Mary has improved so much in manners and appearence she is much prettier than she used to be. She returns to the swamp thursday.

I went up to Uncle Bat to see if I could get some cotton seed from him. He told me I could get some, I want to go up pretty soon and get them.

I went down to the store yesterday with Uncle Jimmy to get him a trunk. We did get one, He is very much pleased with it, payed 4.50 for it.

I broke my Brinly plow this A.M. april 3rd. I then had to stop plowing and make myself another which I did very successfully. I loaned Uncle Harry my harrow on the 3rd to cover cotton with.

Uncle Jimmy went up to Uncle Pats on 4th to spend a while with them. I went over to see Lewis Till last satterday to get some new Allin cotton seed from him but with out sucess.

Marshall caught a little squirrel april 5th

I went up to Uncle Jacks to see the girls last saterday evening and had a fine time on the pond fishing went to church Sunday in John Ross buggy with Deda Ross. (not the late Deda Ross Provance)

The young ladies are to remain until next June 1889. May the Lord grant that the light of peace, health and prosperity may shine upon these charming young ladies with a double brillencey. I can hardly express my gratafacation towards Mr. and Mrs Cogan for the way they entertained that crowd of young people that congregated at there little home.

Satterday night Sept 15 we had another party at Mr. Schwartz which verry unexpected the following named persons were thee, Barnes Wade, Mr. Chase, Marshall Wade, W.B.Wade (callers) Julia Ritzy, George Ritzzy (vistors) Annie Conradd, Katie Schqartz, Minnie Schwartz (hostesses) we all had quite a nice time, talking, and dancing and prominading. We had a four couple square dance (two sets) and a good many waltzes.

Mrs. George Ritzzy furnished the dancing music on the pianna which was simply subblime as she is an accomplished music schollar. Mrs. Ritizzy and myself furnished the crowd withsome music on the violin and pianna.

Sunday Sept 16 Blount and myself went over to Holly Grove in Uncle Pat buggy and Blount and Barnes horses and brought Misses Lula and Neta Killingsworth out to sunday school. We all had a verry nice AM our way out and back home. WE stop on our way back home and hitched the horses on the road side and went grape hunting and found a nice lot of them, we did not get back to Holly Grove until 9 oclock in the evening as the moon was shinning verry bright and pretty and we were enjoying each others company so much that didnt hurry back.

Mr. Raw Cogan finished making molasses Sept 19th he made 25 gallons we got 5 as our share, Green Wheeles is now halling his second lot of (sorgum?)

I finished halling my cain Sept 17 and made 48 bushels, have got 1840 lbs of cotton picked out now.

Emmette came home from Natchez Sept 21. Yellow fever reported in Jackson Sept 18,1888 no trains on the little Jackson RR at present nor on the L N O AND T RR except the (previshions) frait (freight?) trains.

Frank Jones has a boil on his frount finger now and can not do any thing at present.

We are now pulling in corn, have gathered 80 bushels have about 100 more to get in. you are a dam fool if you think me to get corn to sell at 40¢ per bushel.

James Killingsworth spent the night with me Sept 15 half the day of the 16th Mattie, Hellen, Jessie and Barnes Wade came down to call Sunday morning Sept 16 they Sat about 2 hours.
