This is the last book and the most complete, it runs from March 1890 to July 1891

March 13 I came up from Harriston yesterday, will not return for a week yet as the lumber has not come yet from the saw mill for Mc-- house.

The young gentlemen of Harriston want to give a big Ball in Mr. W.C.Terry house next Fryday night if the weather will permit. Asked me to join them but dont think I can so so.

John Davis left Hays sta. the 1st of March 1890 after staying for nearly 18 months. I and Jacob Weis are of his friends that surely sorry he left

Last Sunday eve Marshall and myself hitched up Perer and Patsy our two black donkeys and took a little drive over to Holly Grove to see the the young ladies. We has a verry nice time talking and walking in the pleasant afternoon sun. Marshall went back on Monday on business for Pa.

Last satterday eveining I went up to Port Gibson to see some young ladies had a nice time but did not see the young ladie I went to see, but however I am going again soon.

The above ladies are now in Dallas Tex. March 30, then I will have to post pone my visit until later on.

Nov 9 Miss E.E. with her family now in Natchez may our allmighty creator look and smile upon her with utmost tendercy for he will not let me.

What does a man want to live for when he is all the time in trouble and always was and always will be but thus sayath the lord. Fut it seems to me that I would rather be dead and berried than to be continealy in a stew and some times wish I had never been lorn to fight such a battle of life as I have been doing for the last 18 months, think I will die soon.

I want to go to Harriston this PM to atten a party that is given by the Little --- the., club

I made a big writing desk on the 12 of April.

I built a new brick chimmney at Mr. Wm Wroters house and put up some new weather boarding on each end.

APRIL 1890

I bought a Dog Cart and harness from Weiz and Wagoner at Rodney paying \$25.00 for same.

I went down to Fayette: last Fryday to see Miss-- but did not see her as she was not at home but all the same and just as hard I am going again soon and I'll bet you a Ginger cake that I will see her.

April 12 I made a big desk for Pa. painted it red but I have not finished it yet wount finish next week some time.

Mr. J.Weis was married in April 1890 to Miss Florence Gilthrope (I wish you would stop writing in my book sister and keep your hands off it)

Emmitte and Matshall are shearring the sheep now, they have sheard 17 or 18 and they had to stop on acct of the rain, which by the way was the hardest rain fall I think I ever saw fall in my life it well go a long way towards making a great Mississipp; river rise. Which is now out of its banks from one end to the other and doing a great deal of damage generaly.

I am doing nothing at all now nor have I been doing anything for some time expect to work down at Hays on Mr. Weis house when they start upon it which will be pretty soon Hope to work there for a month or six wks for \$1.50 per day.

I will go down to the Sta this week just for fun and amusement.

July no. 1975 CLIMAX

Just now see here young ladies here is your man you looking for write to me for pitty sake if nothing more. I am the handsomest young fellow in the state of Mississippi all the girls or stuck on me. I have such sweet pretty manners and such a beautiful dancer, and old tensilers one wing of

All to gether I can win any ladies heart but of course never broke one yet and would not do such a thing as that, but could do so if I had a mind to so.

I am 6 ft and 123/4 in and weigh 200 lbs wear a no 143/4 shoes and a long tail Seemore cutaway duster and have 10 pretty turtle bone teeth and six of them dropped out the other day when my girl went to kiss me, The other one is there yet. A young ladie wanted to kiss me the other night at the party but I told her that I was afraid she might swallow my last poor little tooth so she let me off that hop. I am worth \$10,000 567,5700 besides more tobacco, hats and shoes and pants ans I got 5 hats. I aint got but one stove pipe, though and I got it the other day and I have not seen it for some time, I dont know weather to put a new stem in it or not.

There was a table set of about 40 feet long and it was filled to over flow with all sorts of nice things, every one ate to his or her heart content. After which we all partook of the nice ice cream which was just simply good, nice and fine. Hope a few more such days and dinners well come in the near future.

Some thought our friend E.A.Ross and his best partner were going to surprise us all by giving the person a job on the occasion but it seems that the little NO still prevails in stead of the glorious little YES there was about 40 persons spent the day there.

The last week in Oct, I suffered very much with a boil on my right knee, layed up for a week and some days over is not well yet yours truly with a sick leg

Nov. 1890

I have been working Natchez for some time past will stay home now and put up a new house on the place for Sam Chambers to live. Want to add a new room 16 X 16 to the old house and make a double house withone fire place and an 8 foot sheat all the way. Have to buy the boards from Peter Murphy, paying him \$5.00 per thousand after he gets them out will get about 5,000 from him. Will have to camp Sam out until I finish his new quarters.

Sister, Bud, Pug, Tab, and Rich are all started to school this morning at the Brick church to Miss Anna Jones who is misstress. Richard and Tab did not want to go at all. Jack is all alone today he is having a big time with his Billy Goat.

Mr. Emery Clifton, Natchez is a northern man who came to Natchez in Sept 1890 as a Mechanic from Wis. he was taken with a severe attack of rtism (rheumatism?) He and I were great friends.

Miss Rose Cogan, Stonington, left for Church Hill on monday Nov 31st from there she is going traveling all over the morthern part of Miss for her health and strength in company with a lady friend, may joy and peace and success brighten her health.

Ols Rosswood Nov 3, 1890 Miss Rose Cogan

My dear friend you will please pardon me if I am to presumptous in writting you this note. Marshall tells me you are leaving on Monday to be gone until after Christmas, I write you to let you know why I have not been down to see you as per promise. I have been confined to my room for the last week nursing a --which we general call a boil on my knee. And I would like so much to go with Marshall this beautiful sabbath morn to see you. Hoping you will pitty me enough to answer this by Marshall this Pm.

Old Rosswood Nov 3rd My Dear Jessie

Good morning, How are you this beautiful bright sabbath morning. I know you all are seated around a bright sparkling fire reading or talking or eating Hickory nuts or Walnuts and enjoying yourselves hugely. I have just finished my usual sunday morning tolet and made a big fire in the stove and the bright sun is shining in at the windows obright and pretty. Everything is quiet and still as death and lonely. While I write. Wish I could be with you to day, but alas no more pleasure for me while I am in such a fix as I am now

You must tell Hellen not to be to hard on you about "that fellow" as I think ever so much of him myself. He is a nice boy, Dear Coz Mattie how is she, ask her if she will not send me my Hat Mark so long promised me.

You must write me soon and tell me all the news in Red Lick and how every body is getting along. Have you seen sister lately, She has not written me for a long time. Hoping to hear from you soon.

Marshall went up to Oak Hill this Pm on sunday for the first time for nearly a year. Hope he will have a pleasant visit.

Miss Rose Cogan left for Church Hill last week. She will be from home (Rabbit Ridge) for some weeks. Hope she will have anice time as she always seems to have on her stays from home. She is visiting a Mrs. Gibson who is a young widow of only a few summers on the great sea of life.

Barnes Wade and myself went to see Miss Kate Schwartz last tuesday.

Pm and again on thursday Pm both times had a pleasant time Miss Kate
as usual with that bewitching gift of nature was exceedingly entertaining.

Dave Wade egq. of Church Hill vicinity spent several days at Home enjoying himself imencely among the fair sex and trying to recover his health which is very poorly, caused from over worked and improvaince.

I would have gone down to see Cousin Minnie Wade this Pm but for a lameness caused by a boil. Reckon she is glad of it. But you wait awhile. Jeff Wade was due here yesterday eve but from some cause failed to put in his appearance. I think <u>She</u> stopped him on his way here and then it was to late to come any farther She--Katie S.

Pa went up to see Grand Pa this Am will be back direckly

Pete Sharff a young man from Rodney Miss is now clerking for Mr. Leahman Cohn at Lee Miss. Will Watkins left to attend school in Ala. Abe Flonercher is still with Cohn. Has been there for five years. he is a nice fellow and will be sorry when he leaves.

Miss Mattie D.Wade left Red Lick on monday Nov 10th for Jackson Miss to attend the Hinds County Fair. She will be gone 4 or 5 days. Hope she will have a pleasant stay of it. I beleive she will stop with Mrs. Rustins who use to stay in Red Lick but now in Jackson.

Emmett and Hellen Wade came down last sunday Pm from Cottage Home for some sugar cain and they were taking a dog cart ride also, Hellen was looking as usual bright and smiling and made us all feel better, after a pleasant sunday evening chat. Hope she will come again soon she is always so cheerful.

Marshall with Lewis and Willy to help him is now making up our La. Molassess, wont get through this week, Will make about 60-5 gallons

Pa went to Fayette this morning to pay taxes \$100 for Ainself \$22.00 for Ma \$1.75 for me \$27.50 for J.T.Wade.

I believe Anon Killingsworth and Miss Perine Ross are to be married on the 3rd day of December 1890 with Misses Lulu k, and Deda Ross as brides maids and Elvin Ross and Scott Ellice as grooms men. Will be married at 4;30 Pm. And a big oyster and turkey dinner on the 4th. They will not have any company except the members of each family. As all of Red Lick weddens generally pan out that way. All the above is only rummer and cannot say for sure that will really be or not be but there is one thing sure, I would like to be a member of one or the other of the families on the 4th anyway so the dinner would disappear a little faster.

Marshall dug sister a flower pit in her flower garden in Oct. 8 feet long and 1 ft. Heep 4 ft. wide. Sister is verry proud of it. She has it full of pretty flowers.

Do you want to send 50¢ and get the Home and Farm if so just hand me uour money and will send it for you. Today I wrote to Home and Farm asking them about some sick stock. An ox and a horse. Hope they will reply soon as my ox is suffering very much.

Miss Katie Schwartz is now in Rodney visiting Miss Ritzzy, She will spend some time there.

Uncle Pat came down yesterday and lanced my boil which discharged blood and matter very freely for a while and still runs out a little, the matter looked like thick molasses with butter in it.

Marshall has just finished making molassess made 79 gallons.

Papa-- yes my daughter it may but I wish and would like it better if it said "coal was seven dollars a ton"

Last sunday morning I went up to see Seaborn Ross, spent the day with him and in the late Pm He and Miss Jennie(his wife) and myself all called at Oak Hill this is the first time I have been at Oak Hill for some time, I found the inmates of the household verry chatty and pleasant. And there was quite a family on the eve in question at old Oak Hill, For there was John Ross and his Wife (Miss Florence) and little boy. Seaborn Ross his wife (Miss Jennie) and little boy and Eugene Ross and his wife (Miss Della) but no little boy yet. All the young Misses Ross and Elvin Ross and last but not least your humble servant. Invitations are now out for the apporaching wedding of Miss Hellen Perine Ross and Mr.A.R.Killingsworth which takes place on wednesday next December 3rd. Pa and Ma was favored with an invite. Poor Charley Williamson of Stonington, I wonder if he got an invite.

One week to night the Stonington String Band met at Rabbit Ridge for the first time for nearly 3 months, the music was rare rich and rancy.

The last week in Nov me and Marshall built the first Picket and smooth wire fence around a young orchard in coco patch, west of the house. We also planted out the trees 45 apples, 15 peaches 4 mulberry 2 chestnut 12 pears.

I went down to cousin Allison Wades last sunday Pm spent a nice time with cousin Minnie Wade. A.F.Williamson came in a little while after I got there. He came in with an axe on his shoulder to run me out but I no run. Barnes Wade and Emmett wanted to go to see Minnie but C.F.W. and I would not let them.

you will be at Oak Hill next friday night I suppose, tell Miss Beaulah not to come for I know something if she knew she would not like it. I will be there "sepin Ba hame string break"

Holly Grove Dec 8th 1890

Dear Sir

Yours of yeaterday came safely to hand and contence noted. No sir I will not be at Oak Hill on friday night next nor will Beaulah for reasons best unstated. Beaulah has heard what you have refference to it does not dissturbe her at all. Lulu K.

Last saterday Mr.A.R.Killingsworth with his bride and two of his sisters (Miss Lulu and Beaulah) and his nice (Miss Stella Darden) took a ride out to the Red Lick Depot for a little exercise. I was honered with the opportunity of beholding the happy party.

Marshall Wade finished picking cotton last week. Made in the year 1890 23 bails of cotton weighing 450 lbs each.

Willy Scott is now at home from Ark. says he will go to Texas pretty soon, Three cheers for Scott.

Pa took charge of Uncle Jims (J.T.WADE) planation in Dec. 1890. It being an act of the chancery court of Jefferson Co. Uncle Pat (Dr. P.H.Wade)morgaged the place before he gave it to Pa. Pa was required by the court to make a \$2,000 bond which he did. Mr Leahman Cohn the leading merchant of Lee Miss and the Honerable Squire A.P.Darden of Red Lick are his (Pa's) bondsman. Uncle Jim is now living with us.

Marshall and myself killed old John an old bull this the 10th day of Dec. Cut all the best of the meat up into sausage meat.

Marshall, Lewis and myself halled some old rails around the yard this Pm want to fix up the yard fence tomorrow morning.

Miss Rose Cogan of the Stonington neighborhood is now traveling in north Miss. soliciting aid for the orphans assylum of Natchez Miss. Catholic. Hope she will soon return to her home at Stoneington.

Dec. 17 Miss Rose returned last week looking very much improved and as happy as can be, think she and I will take a cart ride as soon as Mr. Paul finishes fixing my cart.

Marshall and Emmett spent the day at Rabbit Ridge, Cousin Allison Wade last sunday found Mr. C.F. Williamson there.

Uncle Pat and I went up to Prospect Hill last night to see Grand Pa He was taken worse last Friday night. I left there this morning expecting to return on tomorrow. Want to go down to Hays this evening to see Mr. Cohn and Weis. I D.B.Wade of the first part, do hearby agree and enter into contract with one Lewis Simpson of the second part, to rent tosaid Lewis Simpson the second part, 13 acres of land on James T.Wade planation at the rate of \$5.00 per acre or \$65.00 in cash of U.S. currency for the use of said land, and two horses during the year A.D. of 1891 begining January 1st and ending Dec. 31st, 1891.

And further more said Lewis Simpson of the second part here by agrees to pay to said D.B. Wade of the first part, the said sum of \$65.00 from the proceeds of the first product raised on the said 13 acres of land on or before the 15th day of Oct. 1891.

And that said Lewis Simpson of the second part hereby agrees to help keep up all fences on said planation and therefore obligated himself to work 15 days on said planation fences under the instruction of W.B.Wade.

D.B.WADE of the first part LEWIS SIMPSON of the second part Millsaps J.P.

Last wensday Dec 17 I went to Port Gibson to sell some hogs but could not get enough for them only $5\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ so I did not sell. I also carried Marshalls gun and watch up to be repaired

Marshall and myself killed 7 head of hogs this week, weight as follows 106-118-102-108-122-125-104 We had to shoot them with a Winchester rifle, Pie Killingsworths gun. We made about 60 lbs of sausage.

Miss Carrie Richardson formerly of Red Lick neighborhood but now of Leaman Landing, Concordia Pa, La. is now visiting Jessie and Hellen Wade at Cottage Home. I called yesterday evening to see my little coz and found her verry lively and entertaining. She and I and Jeff Wade had some music on the violin and zither or Orton Harp. which Carrie performed upon and displayed heavenly music.

On Westerday Dec 22nd I called again at Cottage Home to see my little coz Carrie Richardson. Expected to take her out for a buggy ride but unforntely for me she had gone up to Prospect Hill to see cousin Carrie Wade and I was left. But all the same I had some fun with Jessie and Helen Wade andMiss Katie Schwartz whom I met coming from Dr. Wades and told me that Carrie had just gone so I made all three of the girls that I met get in the buggy on the seat and I climbed in behing. Miss Katie had the rains and kept the old gray mair (sally) in the middle of the road. While I layed the whip on from behind, so we went, We all went back to the Drs. and their found Mrs Smith Ellice and Mr. George Darden and C.F.Williamson. WE all had quite a gay time for awhile.

I will keep bachlors hall in the old Brick quarter house, think I can make 10 bales of cotton and 200 bushels of corn.

Old Rosswood Dec. 26th 1890

My dear Miss Katie

(Christmas Gift Miss Kate)

The band will meet down here to night and you, Miss Rose and Coz Minnie are expected to come with them. I saw Jeff Wade yesterday at Red Lick he asked me to write to you and say to you that he would call by for you. How are you enjoying Xmas I am having a nice time at home with the home folks, Sister and Emmett are expected here after a little with a gallon from Natchez.

Dear Mr. Walter

Thanks awfully for your kind invitation to meet at your house tonight. If it doesent get any colder and Jeff calls for me I shall be glad to go out. I havent been enjoying xmas ever since that ride. I received quite a nice present last night, tho I am sorry to say it did not put me in a very good humor. Hastly I am your friend

Jan. 1891

Last fryday night Dec 26th 1890 we expected the String Bamd at old Rosswood to play some but did not come. Jannie Ross and Deda Ross were the only ones that came. WE all enjoyed our selves verry much, talking and fiddling and poping fire crackers and roman candles and drinking egg nog.

And on satterday night Dec 27th Mr.C.F.Williamson and myself went up to Oak Hill, Carried my violin with us, we found the following named persons present LULU AND NETA KILLINGSWORTH..STELLA DARDEN..JANE AND DEDA ROSS,, A.B. AND PIE KILLINGSWORTH. We all talked, danced ate nuts played the harp and violin.

Wm Warton moved off of Mrs.D.B.Wade planation in Jan 1891 to the old Page place. After making this his home for seven years. When he came here he had but very little, when he left he could have bought a nice little place

Lem Davis moved in Creekfield in Jan 1891 from Judge J.Millsaps place. Elic Foster moved on Chapple Hill near Emaline Homes in Jan 1891 He also came from Judge Millsape place. Wash Homes moved off of Uncle Jims place in Jan 1891.

I took charge of Uncle Jims planation in 1891 Having some trouble with the hands on it.

J.Reeves Wade and his daughter Annie went to Jackson to spend xmas They stayed three days, I and Uncle Jim stayed with Aunt Lottie while they were in Jackson.

Last satterday Dave and Jeff andRoss wade (A.R.Wades sons) spent the day with us the first time Dave ever did stay any at Rosswood. Ross also has his second visit to make.

Sister is now staying with Aunt Jinnie Killingsworth, Miss B, Killingworth is also spending a while with Aunt Jinnie, Aunt Jinnie is sick, Sister has been away from home for two days and it seems to me that it had been about two weeks. Hope she will come home soon.

State of Mississippi, Jefferson county

This agreement made by and between W.B. Wade party of the first part
and Sam Chambers party of the second part.

I W.B.Wade party of the the first part hereby agrees to rent to Sam Chambers party of the second part a house to live in and all the land to cultivate that he had last year (1890) also about $(1\frac{1}{2})$ one and one half acres of land just behind the said house for the sum of niney dollars (\$90.00) in U.S. currency to payed on or before the 15th day of November 1891.

And the said Sam Chambers party of the second part agrees to work 15 days on planatation fences and to keep up the fence around a certain lot just north of the said house. And also keep the house up and in good order. The above house and land described is rented to Sam Chambers for one year 1891.

All of The said same land lying on and being a part of Mr.W.B.Wade plantation.

Writting in hand this the 7th day of January 1891.

Bob Ray came over this morning to see about his contract on James T. Wades Plantation for 1891. I will go down to Mr. L.Cohn store this Pm.

Emmett went out to the Red Lick this morning to get the mail. Hope he will be back soon. I want to see the newspapers.

Grand Pa died on Saterday January 11th, 1891 aged 77 years. He was an invalid for nearly two years, he suffered verry much during that time.

Isaac R.Wade was the father of (10) ten sons and (2) two daughters and (31) thirty one Grand Children up to his death. (23) twenty three grand sons an (8) eight grand daughters.

Six of his sons never reached manhood before they died. ROSS, WILLY, JACKY, ISAAC JR (no 1) and ISAAC JR. (no2), and one infant born dead.

DUNBAR B. WADE married Martha R. (reeves) Wade (his first cousin) in Dec, 1865 and have nine (9) children living and one boy born dead (twins) Six boys and three girls now living.

BEN YOUNG WADE married his second cousin CORDELIA MAUD GARRETTE in 1868 or 69. They had seven children (5) five boys and two girls. Two of his boys died verry young, They were twins, his oldest daughter EULA MAUD WADE died at the age of 15 years. They have four (4) left now three boys and one little girl.

KATE ALLISON WADE was married to Mr. EDD NEWELL in the year of 1870 or 71 I think. They had (6) six children born to them five boys and one girl, they have lost two of there boys. They live in Tensas Parrish La.

JENNIE ALLIASON WADE was married to R.T.KILLINGSWORTH IN Dec 18at Prospect Hill, Jefferson County Miss. They have four (4) children born to them (2) two boys and (2) two girls, they now live at Rosswood.

BATTLE HARRISON WADE married CARRIE O. WADE in Dec 18-- at Cottage Home, they are third cousins. Carrie is the daughter of Dr.P.H. Wade. They have (3) three little boys.

THOMAS MAGRUDER WADE married ANNA _ MAGRUDER at Cabin Woods in 18-They have one (1) little boy.

We put her away in the grave vard at the Rick church January 1891

Emmett and Marshall and myself killed and butchered three Hogs last wk. in Jan 1891. They weighed 125-130 and 115. We have a few more to kill yet they are verry wild.

Pa went down to Church Hill last tuesday to do some surveying for a Mr. Thomson. He will be gone until next week some time.
