She lived all together with the negros and when she died no white person was at her burial except myself, Barnes Wade, Wm Wroten, Levy Wambeck, John Page and her oldest daughter Mattie. We put her away in the grave vard at the Rick church January 1891

Emmett and Marshall and myself killed and butchered three Hogs last wk. in Jan 1891. They weighed 125-130 and 115. We have a few more to kill yet they are verry wild.

Pa went down to Church Hill last tuesday to do some surveying for a Mr. Thomson. He will be gone until next week some time.

Hope she may soon be up and about again, Cottage Home is dull with out her pleasant smiles and cheering and home making ways. Miss Neta Killingsworth and Ma sitting up with her.

Coz Button Wade is allso verry low and has been for some time. I want to go up to see him this Pm. Hope to find him better than reports say he is. Coz Button has been living in La for some past but has a great many warm friends in Red Lick.

Coz Allesion Wade came down to see me about my taxes and stayed all night with us and all the next day as it rained so he could not get away. I was glad of it for we all enjoyed his company verry much. Hope he will come again soon.

#### Jan. 1891

To pickel Pork

The following is an excellent recipe for pickeling Pork, when the meat is first cut up, sprinkle over it a little salt peter to draw out the blood. Make a pickel as follows

To one gallon of water allow one and one half pounds of salt, ½ lb operage one fourth ounce of saltpeter, one half ½ ounce of pure potashe. Make a large quanity in like perportions. Boil and skim until and as long as no skim rises. Put Pork in a barrell and pour it on until all the meat is covered up interely.

## FEBRUARY 1891

On sunday the 1st day of Feb which was my 24th birthday I spent at Oak Hill Hill. A pleasant day it was to. In the late Pm of the day in question I went with Elven Ross down to Red Lick

where we found a crowd of young men amusing there selves by haveing a little game of pitchen dollars in a hole. Among them was Mr Percy Chamberlain with whom I went over to Holly Grove to see the young ladies, We were not there long before Old Mr. Charley Williamson and Elvin Ross were there too. Thus it was that Misses Neta and Lulu had four dead beets to entertain until eleven oclock at night.

Every fellow had his saying to say and did not want the other one to hear what it was. Poor simple fools that we were, you should have been there and seen us. Well now them young ladys took advantage of the occation and had there own fun. You bet. Two of our party, the young dudes of Red Lick had a nice little scheme fixed up to beat some body, but I 'kinder' think they were 'sorta' left all around. Ah well such is the ways of the modern world

Well 'pop she goes' well you be so kind if you please man, and I would be ever so much obliged to you if you please, and as I was going to ask you if you have no objections you know how it is with a fellow he is kinda "skeered"

But how ever that maybe you must not think hard of me for asking you if you please mam about the matter for I am sure you wont care if I ask you a little favor of you and as I was going to say, if you please maps and I thankey, too but you know you must not say you cant for I know better. And as I started to say at first, Have you any objection of going out buggy riding with me some time next week.

Ma with her babie son Jacky went out to Red Lick yesterday to see Aunt Lottie and Annie, She says she spent a pleasant while with them. On the way back she stoped in at Dr. Wades to see his sick daughter Miss Mattie Wade who has been confined to her bed for nearly a month with Rmtsm.

I went down to Mr. L.Cohn store this morning and got \$1.00 worth of writting paper and a bottle of ink and 4 pen holders and 4 lead pencils a box of mustard and a letter for Pa and a story paper for Emmett and two letters and some papers for Roger k, wanted to get some stockings for the children but did not have any to suit. I then went down to Hays sta, to get them but had none down there.

Pa went out to Red Lick this morning has not got back yet. Looking for him now.

Ma and Jacky went up to see Aunt Janie this morn ing who is sick in bed it was a bad day for Ma to be out but she would go. Hope she will enjoy her trip.

Emmett and Marshall both are sick with La Grippe now we all have had it except Pug. Hope she will not have it.

I want to go over to Lewis Simpson this Pm want him to hawl some logs for me.

Robert Ray a tennant on Uncle Jim place came over this morning to get some fence wire and nails and staples with which to build up a new fence in Creek field with.

Marshall traded his stallion to Mr. Bob Higdon for a black mair and \$50.00 to boot. The mair he calls "Black Mollie"

On the 3rd of Feb I received the following note from Elvin Ross Dear Walter How would you like to go out to our (eastton lastton?) if you will please let me know and I will send you word what day it comes off. I have not heard but think pretty soon, Percy says he will be on hand. Let me hear from you. Please excuse haste. Keep this to yourself strickly and private.

Dear Elvin yours received, Just you let me know when it comes off and you may bet it is a go with me. Let me hear from you.

### 2/4/1891

Weather good to day for the first time in two week from all appearence it will stay so for a while , any how god knows it has been raining long enough. I think so any how if he doesent. Every body is about well of La Grippe except Marshall and Emmett who is still on the sick list and hopes to be well in a few days so they can go to work. No work done yet.

We all have been down with La Grippe in fact every body in the whole state of Miss is sick with it. White and black, old and young, May God ever bless poor little me and not let me have it again soon. I suppose every body thinks the same way about it.

Pa and I went down to Lee (or Mr.L.Cohn store) yesterday to make a contract with Emalines Homes and Lewis Simpson also to make arragements with Mr. Cohn in reguards to him suppling them.

Emmett went down to the Alliance meeting yesterday did not get back until this Am dont know where he spent the last Pm and night but rather think he was kinder "Chamberlain" struck though "struck" as all young men of his age and vanity well get "struck"

On the 4th day of Feb I made a new pigon house for Richard, he is verry proud of it, now he has two Houses and 12 pigons.

On the 11th I finished my cistern on Uncle Jims place at Emaline Homes house it has a wooden arch locust poles layed across and covered over with dirt. It cost me as follows

Emmette and Marshall and myself with Sam Chambers, West Hart, Freeman Lee Elax Foster, Lenard Davis and Lewis Simpson are all trying to put up a wire fence around the old Brick quarter place for a pasture but it keeps on raining so that we can not keep at it long enough to do any thing on it.

A.R. Wade here this morning before day light. After Marshall as a witness.

Miss carrie Fulton of Church Hill neighborhood is now visiting her sick mother at Mr. Will Cogans in Stoneignton neighborhood. Mrs. Fulton has all the sympathy of every body of the county. Hope she will soon be up and about again.

H.D.WOOD (Harrice) was indited by the Grand Jury for disturbing the peace and dignity of the state of Miss. and was sentanced \$25.00 find and cost and 30 days in the county jail, he pleaded quilty and begged for mercy of the court.

A young man by the name of Fergerson was in the same trouble and they are now in Jail of Jefferson County serving out there thirty days.

Pa and myself went to Fayette yesterday to attend court where in Marshall was a witness in Harrice Woods and Fergerson case.

I saw and had a nece talk with my friend Matt Coffee in Fayette and enjoyed it verry much.

Preaching at the church uesterday but had just a few to hear the sermon Mr. Benjamin, Mr and Mrs W.A.Ross, Dr.P.H.Wade, C.F.Williamson, W.B.Darden, Emmette and Walter Wade, F.C.Paul we had a pretty good singing with out the aid of the organ. Hope we will have a better congreation Next time in March.

Me and Emmette and Marshall are trying to build up another shed on the south side of the corn house, will use it for a stable shed. Will take down the old stable that I put up several years ago. Hope we will be able to finish it this week, it is now monday at noon. Verry much rain in January and Feburary. So much so that every body is getting behind with there crops and I am verry much afraid that we will be a long way behind as we have so much fencing to do yet. And it keeps on raining so that a fellow caint get at it.

yours in a bad humor A unt Jennie is now very sick, poor Aunt Jennie she seems to have a hard time of it, is sick nearly all the time. Hope she will soon be up and about again.

Uncle Bob came down today to see Mr. Roger Killingsworth on some business Pa saw him this morning say's he will be down two or three days yet but I dont believe him at all.

Miss Lulu Killingsworth one of Red Lick charming Belles is now visiting in the Harriston community the quest of her sister Mrs. James D.Wade. she will likely spend two wks. Hope she will be at home next saterday night as I want to see her verry much and I expect to go to Holly Grove on that night.

Miss Neta and old Aron was to drive the two girls back to holly Grove and Pie was to get on his horse and go down amd call upon Miss Minnie So our party of three reached the sta. some time before the train did and Pie being in some what of a hurry he got on his horse and rides off before the train comes. And leaves the remainder of his party to At last the train comes but is Miss Neta there wait for Miss Neta. no, no, Neta failed to make an appearence, Now What, Pie is gone and where is old Aron, and there sits Miss Lulu in the buggy holding the horses with out any body to help her withthere management of the gay and gallant team.

## THE STORY OF MR. WHITE AND HIS DAUGHTER

It was on a bleak January night and the gods of torment were sailing all around the beautiful and well populated residence of Mr. White who was a noble old gentleman , grey head and long soft snow like beard. He was a queer old man of about sixth years. From boy hood up to the time he was forty five or fifty, he spent a great part of his time hunting and up to this he had collected quite a lot of old curosities in his beautiful manshion of Concord (the name of his residence). No Mr. White was not much of a man for ladies company and often he would shun them when it was really to his own inteest to meet them. he married a nice lady from the yankee land and she made him an excellent I think he married, I think about rhe year 1835 and lived at Concord for a long time and raised a large family of girls and boys Mr. White was not a good father or husband to his poor faithful wife or to his poor little children. nor was he a good neighbor, he was not to say despised by his neighbors but his pecular way made him unpopular way made him unpopular generally speaking. He was verry selvish, would not allow a man to even take a single squirrel or bird from his imense woods and borad feilds. There you have a small idear of what kind of a man our Mr. White is and I hope you will be kind enough to remember it.

Now Mr. White had three daughters, Mollie, Susan and Anna, they were good and kind to there father and brothers and well and much thought of among the young people of the neighborhood, Especially among the young gentlemen.

Mollie the oldest one was a verry beautiful young lady of twenty four She had coal black hair which she wore combed in a beautiful set of bangs which hung so even and nece just over the prettyest pair of coal black eyes ever I saw. She was a lady that always commanded ,much respect from all thoes whom was so fortunate as to know her and was also a good christian..

Susan the second was a spicey little piece of hummanity of about twenty years with dark brown hair and blue eyes and weighed about ninety pounds she was not as popular as eather of her two sisters. She was verry high tempered and old maidish like and look upon all young gentlemen as a verry great mistake was made because god didnt make al boys girls instead of boys. But at the same time she was verry conceited, she thought there was no body in all the wide world like Miss Susan White of Concord of the Ashland Neighborhood. She thought she was the belle of the neighborhood, She had a great liking as all county girls do have for the young men in town, and once upon a time I knew poor Miss Susan get badly left.

Now one august evening in 18-- the Whitefield girls gave a grand ball ah oh the ball of the season and every body was expected form the surrounding neighborhood of Ashland. And a goodly number of ladies and gentlemen was also invited and expected. Ah ha thought Miss Susan to her self I know I will have some fun tonight for all the boys of the Ashland neighborhood are stuck on me already and I know I can attract the dudes from town for what boy is it that ever saw me that didnt pronounce me the prettiest girl they ever saw, her perfectly beautiful, I know for every body says so. So Miss Susan went to the Ball at the beautiful Whiteield mansion about four miles distant from Concord with her two sisters and one of her brothers.

On the arrival at the Whitifield residence she saw all the house lighted up and the sweet strains of the band music rolled out and floated upon the soft summer night air and reached the ears of the four from Concord with little sweetness. Willy Whitifield was the first to meet the party and aided the young ladies from the buggy while Allison White hitched the team and then they all walked up to the great lighted door. While they were on the way up to the door Willy had slipped around and got by the side of Miss Susan and gallently offered her his arm while she accepted with an air of indifference. Willy noticed but said nothing to her about it however, they at last reached the door when one of the Whitefield girls met them and esscorted them to a dressing room.

Soon they were all in the parlor waiting for the gentlemen to enter and choose his partner for the first quadrill, pretty soon Willy Whitfield entered the parlor and asked Miss Susan to dance the first set with him, she verry humblingly refused him for she saw a young town dide standing near the door of the parlor and had set her mind upon capturing his heart for a time anyway, but alas not so, she failed to have a nice time at all poor little Susan, she went back home that night with a heavy heart and dampened eyes.

Miss Anna White had unconciously done, what she, had planned to do and captured Her town dude.

Miss Anna White was very different from the other two, She was a blond and not exceedingly pretty and at the same time she was not to say homily. She was possed of a nost glorious nature of all, kind, she was a bright smiling girl of about 18 summers and a most perfect figgure, not much for gayiety but rather a religious kind of a girl and not verry attractive at all but thoes that knew Miss Anna pronounced her as being a good, sweet, kind hearted girl.

Miss Rose Cogan left for Vicksburg in June 1893 to enter the Catholic nunnery it was with much sorrow and regret that her parents, relations and friends gave her up.

I'built'a seed house at Red Lick in Sept 1892 for the Port Gibson oil wells. W.P.Darden agent for them. I had David and Jeff Wade helping me paying them one dollar per day, making \$23.50 out of the job for myself.

Harper Scott and Percy Chamberlain came up to have a game of seven-up last week. Harper is now spending some tiem with Percy.

Pie, Elvin and Percy are out in Piney woods on a camp squirrel hunt, they promised to send me some if they killed enough.

The following was copyed from the Fayette chroncle of Feb 24th 1893 It was sent to the F.C. for publication from Red Lick but I think it was copied by who ever sent it from some book of poetry.

the eyes maybe deep and dark for you they were verry bright but I hardly think he knew your heart or you would have been alright.

his tender voice you could hear how would this voice of mine suit to wisper soft words within your ear then the parson shall tie the loop

you could not even tell him good bye
I am sure the thought this very strange

how can you expect him to return does he know the seceret there if he does he will return and him your burdens bear

## FEBURARY 1891

In Feb Marshall, Emmette and myself tore down and moved the old four stall stable out to the south side of the corn crib, it now has five stall in it.

We finished the wire fence around the old brick quarter houses putting them in the pasture, the last week in Feb. About three quarters of a mile lime of wire fence, six hundred pounds of new wire, used some old wire.

## MARCH 1891

We started to plowing last monday the 2nd of March 1891. We have about six acers ready for planting on the popular ridge.

Miss Neta Killingsworth one of Red Lick charming belles is now spending a week with her sister, Mrs R.T. Killingsworth at Rosswood

Very hard hail storm and rain on the night of the 6th of March 1891 no great damage done in this county as I have heard yet. You may know of it yourself.

Last thursday Pm I called to see Miss Katie Schwartz and spent a few hours with her talking. Which I will never forget, I found Jeff Wade of Church Hill and his sister Miss Minnie spending a while with Miss Katie, Jeff is a great admirer of Katie.

Francis and Bud will start to sowing cotton the Pm April 29, I want to go down the Alliance meeting next saterday and join them. I sent my petition in some time ago.

We are now having fine bright sunshining weather, just right for working, not to hot nor to cold except early in the morning.

The Stoneington String Band met at your Fathers last night and had some verry good music. considering the time laspe since we have met, We found we had no bow for the bass violin. Said you carried it off with you and I would like it verry much if you would send or bring it back as soon as you get a chance to do so. as we want to play somemore on it through the summer, Mr. Williamson and myself were over at Holly Grove last sat. night to play soome for the girls but upon investigation after getting there I found that I had lost my bow on the road so we had but one violin to run.
