## Clanton D. Adams

Clanton D. Adams was born in Marion County, Ala., on February 8, 1881. He was married to Miss Lelia Bostick of Iuka, Mississippi, in 1907. He came to Iuka to live in 1906, possibly the same year he went to work for the Post Office Dept. in the Railway Mail Service. He served on the Southern Railroad from Memphis to Chattanooga, Tenn., until his death in 1940. He spent much of his spare time in Masonic work. For many years, Clanton was an avid bird hunter. After he lost his prized bird dog, he practically quit hunting. He and his wife were survived by a son, Melville Adams, of Sheffield, Ala.; and one daughter, Mrs. Melvin Harris, of Margerum, Ala.
