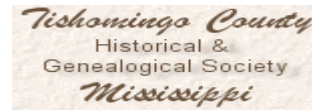

## Cochran-Moser Cemetery

### Tishomingo County, Mississippi

Once known as the Moser Cemetery, the Cochran-Moser Cemetery was surveyed by Shorty Bonds on November 4, 1996, for the Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society (TCHGS). The following burial information was transcribed from TCHGS' book entitled *Tishomingo County Mississippi Cemeteries* by Helah Wilson and Janice Switcher on November 3, 2005.

**Driving Directions:** From the four-way intersection at Iuka, Mississippi, travel approximately 6 miles on Highway 25 North to County Road 982. Turn left, drive 0.1 of a mile to County Road 274, and drive 1 mile to County Road 283. Turn left on County Road 283; drive approximately 0.4 of mile. The cemetery is on the left side of the road, approximately 200 yards into a cow pasture. Section 28, Range 10 and Township 2.

Note: This cemetery was once known as the Moser Cemetery. Approximately 18 graves are marked only with sandstones. There is one broken monument that is unreadable. According to the Biggs and Barnes cemetery book, Mr. and Mrs. Moser are reportedly buried here, but the monument is missing.
