S/SGT. HAMMOND A RHODES STILL MISSING - NO WORD

S/Sgt. Hammond A. Rhodes, 34, 425,668, Air Corps, who was the son of Mr. And Mrs. Albert Rhodes, Jr. was reported missing in action October 2, 1943. The War Department has entertained the hope that he survived and that information would be revealed dispelling the uncertainty

surrounding his absence. However, as in many cases, the conditions of warfare deny us such information. The record concerning him shows he was a crew member of a B-24 plane (Liberator).

“On October 2, 1943, while en-route from Port Moresby to Wewak, New Guinea, a message was received from his plane that they were entering bad weather. The plane was then over mountainous territory about 250 miles southwest of Wewak. The crew was not heard from again and searching planes found no trace of plane or crew. Twelve months have now expired without the receipt of evidence to support a continued presumption of survival. “The finding does not establish an actual or probable date of death however, as required by law, it includes a presumptive date of death for the termination of pay and allowances. The Adjutant General, Ulie.”

Hammond’s only brother, Lyman Rhodes S1/c, who is stationed at U.S.S. Texas, is home on furlough. He has participated in three major battles, both invasions, and also Cherobourg Harbor.
