Tishomingo County Agricultural High School

(Transcribed by RaNae Vaughn from The Vidette, Vol. XXXIX No. 48, August 2, 1923)

Tishomingo County Agricultural High school was established November 9, 1914. professor J. O. Looney was its first Superintendent, serving until 1918 when W. R. nettles was made superintendent. Professor Nettles has served in this capacity since that time.

The school opened with an enrolled of about 70 in the high and public school. The enrollment last year had increased to 250. The enrollment for the coming year will probably reach 450 due partly to consolidation.

The school has served more than 1,200 high school students since it opened. 141 have graduated and 66 of these during the past two years. The school is affiliated with all the colleges of the state and has been since 1919. Graduates are given license to teach without examination.

The school offers 22 units of work composed of the following: English, Mathematics, History, Civics, Education, Agriculture, Home Economics, poultry, Terracing, Economics.

The demands on the school at present calls for expansion. Smith-Hughes work will probably be added this year. Other improvements and additions are to be made as soon as possible.
